PARCELS

Thanks to the efforts of Charley (Charlotte) Hill and her mother, Jane, we are able to send parcels to Sierra Leone from time to time. Charley is also a member of our team and visited St. Matthew's on a number of occasions on our behalf.

Most recently parcels have been sent to Vikki Luke, the maternity nurse whose marriage we were able to tell you about in our January Newsletter. Vikki has, in the past, provided accommodation for visitors from our parish.

Jane and Charley are experts in acquiring items from a wide range of sources to send to Vikki. Recent parcels have, not surprisingly, contained newborn baby items, some of them knitted by ladies at our church. Cot blankets, babygrows, vests and other items have been donated from various sources.



Parcels have also included medical items such as vinyl gloves, plastic aprons, face masks and face shields and things which can be used in other areas of the hospital in which Vikki works. This can be anything from thermometers, steristrip and compression bandages.

If anyone is ever renewing the contents of their first aid kits and has unopened items which are "out of date" please let us know because if it is unopened and clean it can often be recycled.

Not surprisingly, there is a certain amount of bureaucracy involved in sending these parcels. Charley tends to deal with this and copes with all the form filling. In the past everything sent has had to have a European Code. Whether or not this was still needed caused

some confusion with DHL who were the agent used for sending the parcels. Much of the confusion, apparently, was because the very nice person at DHL thought Africa was part of Europe.
